- 5. Pro-actively target drug related criminality.
- 6. Address any vulnerabilities identified from exploitation or Cuckoo'ing.
- 7. Feedback actions taken to partners and the community via Derbyshire alert, newsletters and social media.

THE BARROW UPON TRENT "FLOOD SEASON"

From November 23 through to February 24 we have experienced exceptional rainfall, resulting in a very high water table level, which in turn, has contributed to considerable flooding across South Derbyshire, and of course our own village, Barrow on Trent.

During the floods, we would also ask that you are all take care of both you and others.

We constantly ask parishioners, both adults and children, not to walk through the floods, this is for your own safety. The main reason for this is that the drain covers can come loose and lift off the drain holes, leaving an exposed large hole. There was an instance in the January 24 flood where a parishioner fell into a drain hole, where the lid had lifted, and injured themselves quite badly. Falling into one of these flooded drains can cause serious harm, so please only walk through flood water if it is necessary and if you have a stick to feel your way along.

Another main reason is, that there maybe raw sewerage, animal effluent and potential farming chemicals in the flood water. But it must be mentioned that with the amount of flooding in Barrow, the contamination level reduces dramatically.

Also, please note that should you drive through flood water, your car may not be insured, and with this in mind, please think twice before trying to venture through deep water.

And may we respectfully ask that when you have to drive through flood water, can you consider the impact of the "water wash" that occurs, which in turn, can then cause local flooding inside residential properties. We ask that IF you have to drive through flood water, can you kindly drive at a maximum of 3 mph (i.e. walking speed).

Flood Road Closures; We know you may find this annoying, but we close the Brookfield end of Twyford Road, to save a number of residential properties that are prone to heavy flooding at the cross roads. So, can we kindly ask you not to ignore or move the closed signs, as you may not be aware of the damage that you may be causing to the local houses. Also, if you know of any vulnerable parishioners, please take a moment to look out for them.

We thank you for your kind consideration of others.



One of the situations that has become apparent during the recent floods, is that our lovely local postman is unable to get to parts of the village to deliver post.

The Brookfield has been kind enough to help, and they will accept post to be delivered to them, on behalf of parishioners that Mr Posty is unable to reach. Also, The Brookfield has kindly confirmed that they will take parcel deliveries as well, if needed e.g amazon deliveries.

We will be checking into the legalities of this, but hope that a simple system can be put in place to ensure that the recipient of the post is happy for their post or parcel deliveries to be delivered to The Brookfield.



We are noticing more and more potholes appearing on the roads in the village and surrounding areas....mainly due to the recent floods.

This is the responsibility of Derbyshire County Council, who we work closely with.

The best way to report these holes, is through the LoveCleanStreets app (the app looks like above). It's

really easy to download the app on your phone... you then just need to register your name and area, and then you can either take a picture of the pothole which submits it through the app, which immediately registers where the pot hole is, or you can simply report it on the app, without a picture – if it is not safe to take a photo.

A number of potholes, along with a badly damaged loose curb stone on Twyford Road have been reported using this App. So, please report anything that you may see via this app.

You can also use it to report Fly tipping, Street Issues, lighting issues, full bins plus many more things please have a look at the app its very useful.

The more reported issues that are reported through the app, the quicker the council will respond. They work in areas, so the more offending holes and damaged road areas that we report, then the more they will fix when they visit our area.



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BARROW ON TRENT VILLAGE HALL COMMITTEE

The Committee hopes that we find everyone well and (at the time of writing) after a very wet few months – Spring will offer us dryer weather with a little sunshine.

The Hall remains in good order, ongoing maintenance work and upgrading continues. Regular 'deep cleaning' of the Hall takes place throughout the year.

We have our Solar Panels installed, awaiting connection with a view to reducing our energy costs over the coming years. Our 'Hive' which is connected to the gas boiler will provide members of the Committee along with our Caretaker remote access to the heating system, which will alleviate the need for weekly programming - thus ensuring the heating is only used specifically as and when required.

The Committee have taken the decision to install Wi-Fi into the Village Hall, which hopefully will be connected at some point over the next few weeks. Many of our clients who use the Hall regularly have asked for access to Wi Fi, and the Committee felt it was an important feature which will enhance the Halls suitability for party and meeting hire. The Hall currently has a hearing loop. However, the system is guite dated and with the installation of Wi Fi the Committee are looking into modernising the current system, along with purchasing microphones for speakers to use which will be interactive. This should improve the experience for hearing aid users who attend functions within the Hall.

Our financial position remains stable, in part this is thanks to our regular users. We have a variety of weekly and ongoing monthly events, which include: Our village Playgroup – daily use in term time, exercise classes, choir practice, Parish Council meetings, yoga, Women's Institute meetings, Church Group meetings and pilates classes etc. The Hall also continues to be used for parties and events.

At the end of 2023 - Steph Shilton who has been an excellent caretake and bookings clerk over the years left her role with the Village Hall. Steph and her husband will be missed, they have made a large contribution to gaining bookings for the hall via our Facebook page. As many of you will know Steph and her husband are a busy couple looking after their children, we wish them well for the future. The Committee thanked Steph for all her hard work providing vouchers and chocolates by way of a 'thank you'

We are delighted to confirm we have appointed a new Caretaker /Bookings Clerk – Jo (Joanne) Bloor. Many of you will already know Jo, who lives in the village with her family.


