After many years of wishing, planning, fundraising, discussing, and negotiation, we have at last arrived at the end of the building part of our

Transformation project.

What we now have is an amazing building which we can <u>all use</u>, whenever we want.

The official handover day from the builders to the village is on 4<sup>th</sup>





December. The Project team will be there to take back responsibility for the church and churchyard, and to learn how to use all the new and amazing equipment installed there.

What we now have is a light and airy, warm and comfortable building that welcomes everyone. And you won't have to wear your coat all the time you are in there!

The pictures only tell part of the story. When we are able to open up to everyone, you will see what the parish has spent so much time and effort in achieving. Our grateful thanks go to the builders, H A Briddons, especially their Site Manager Rob, and chief electrician Simon, who have worked tirelessly to make the building work as we want it to do. The workmanship is amazing, and the team of craftsmen have treated the church as though it is their own -



making sure that it is treated with respect and care at all times.

We don't yet know when we will be able to open the



church fully to the public when we have a better idea of the new Covid Tier restrictions, we will publish dates for everyone to visit. We had planned a Christmas event, but lockdown has meant that it is impossible to plan this without better information about the pandemic.

We intend to have a Christmas Eve Midnight Communion with restricted numbers for social distancing, but please keep an eye open for an Opening Event in the New Year.

The building work has been the first part of our project - we can now concentrate on providing Activities and Events for everyone to join in. Covid has stopped any events over the last year going ahead, but we have lots of ideas for 2021!

You may have noticed the seesaw in the small play park has been removed, it had sadly become dangerous. It is hoped to install a new piece of play equipment there in the new year. The Susie Dixon Park has not only been used for Football this summer but also for socially distanced exercise classes once Covid restrictions allowed. We have continued to maintain the Parish Cottages and keep them in tip top condition. Greenacres has seen a huge increase in visitors this summer with people taking their daily exercise. Sadly, this also caused an increase in Dog Fouling and litter, please clean up after yourselves and bin your rubbish. The Grass at Greenacres has just recently had its big mow which should make walking round easier it is left till later in the year so all the plants can seed.


The Clerk is happy to accept phone calls between the hours of 9am – 11am and 5pm – 6pm Monday to Thursday.

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# Winter Wildlife Watch

Winter is a magical but difficult time for nature and whilst the majority of us will be curled up inside all warm and cosy, there are still plenty of comings and goings in the hedgerows, fields and trees around our village. Birds, Rabbits, Foxes and Squirrels will be scurrying around making the best of the light and foraging for that all important food source to keep them well nourished and warm during this period. Whilst it may look to us that there are plenty of berries to go around at this time of year helping our furred and feathered friends from our own back gardens can be hugely beneficial. Here are some ways in which you can help this Winter and some all important tips provided by the RSPCA as a guide to keeping our wildlife fed and safe.

- When food is scarce, putting out a small amount of an appropriate treat will help to see the birds and mammals visiting your garden through the winter.
- For Foxes: Cheese, boiled potatoes, chicken carcasses (please be mindful of Cats and Dogs), bread and fat scraps at dusk
- For Squirrels: Nuts such as Hazlenuts, Walnuts and Almonds plus some chopped apple, beans, carrots or spinach
- For Birds: Seeds, fresh unsalted peanuts, cheese and fruits such as apples and pears. Garden birds also love dried mealworms and wax worms which can easily be picked up from your local pet shop. Different birds have different tastes, for example Goldfinch which we have an abundance of in the village love Nigella Seeds!

Make sure that you are regularly cleaning all feeders and changing out old food to avoid causing sickness.

Most importantly grab those binoculars and enjoy the flurry of activity your little garden feast attracts!

# Make your own bird feeder

Making your own birdfeeder is fun and easy and can be a great way to involve the whole family.

#### What you'll need:

A cardboard tube (kitchen or toilet roll tube is perfect), 2 long sticks or skewers, Lard/Suet or Vegetable Suet, Birdseed spread on a plate or tray and a piece of string.

#### Method:

Start by making four holes in one end of your cardboard tube, these should be large enough for your skewers but not so large that the sticks fall out.

Make sure the holes opposite each other line up so that you can thread your sticks through.

Next make two small holes in the opposite end of your tube.

Use a butter knife or spatular to spread the Lard or Suet and cover the tube.

Put a layer of bird seed onto a plate and roll your tube until completely covered in the seed.

Finally, carefully thread the stick in a cross shape through the holes and tie a piece of string through the two holes made at the opposite end.

You now have your very own homemade bird feeder! Experiment with cardboard and different shapes too!

## THE VICAR, THE REVD. TONY LUKE WRITES...

Dear friends,

Listen to these words, written some five hundred years or so before Jesus' birth by the

prophet, Isaiah. "The people who

walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness- on them light has shined."

By anyone's estimation 2020 has been a difficult and trying year. None of us imagined in the New Year what a profound impact a new virus called Covid-19 would have on all our lives and, in fact, on the lives of everyone around the world. Our lives have been restricted. We have been unable to visit loved ones. Public worship has been suspended. Businesses have been struggling and going to the wall with resulting job losses. People have been dying and our health and emergency services have been overstretched. Despite all this, we will have perhaps found it easier to cope, when we heard in recent days that there was light at the end of the tunnel, when thanks to the labours of scientists around the world, vaccines have been developed, which will hopefully enable this disease to be conquered and life return to normal. In the midst of darkness, we human beings always need the hope of light, the dawn of something better.

When Isaiah speaks about the people in darkness seeing a great light he is preaching to a people staring down the sharp point of the arrows of Babylon. Their national life was in tatters, their country had been invaded, their Temple desecrated and knocked down and their leaders taken off into exile. How they needed to hear a message of hope, of light! In the Christmas story according to St. Luke, the angels proclaim their message of great joy to shepherds who are the outcast of the outcast: in many towns, they are barred from entering the city gates because of the stigma of their job. We who gather this Christmas to worship a God, who loved us so much that he gave up everything to be born a totally dependent baby in a backwater town to soon to be refugee parents, is, by any rational standard, ridiculously stupid and yet it is what makes Christmas so very special.

God loves us so much that he left the light of heaven to enter the darkness of our broken humanity. He did so in a manger in Bethlehem just over 2,000 years ago, and he continues to do so, every moment of every day, through human people like you and me who choose to live in the hope of the light rather than the despair of the darkness. We, like the Israelites to whom Isaiah spoke, walk in darkness, but on us and on all humanity, a light has shined." We take hope from the words of St. John, which we hear so often at Christmas: "The light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it."

This Christmas, I pray that our eyes will be open to see the light, to reflect it in our lives, and recognize the hope for the world which the coming of Jesus brings.

### **VILLAGE HALL COMMITTEE**



This year has been very challenging for everyone with the restrictions imposed due to Covid-19. Committee members have been working very hard since early Spring - helping to keep the Village Hall safe for our hirers. Regular weekly checks on the property (to ensure all is well) have taken place. The Committee has followed regular guidance received from 'Rural Action Derbyshire' Village Halls team who have helped us to understand what has been required to help keep the hall safe and open for use, i.e. track and trace, sanitizers, face masks social distancing etc.

Wherever possible we have tried to keep the hall available for small groups - following guidance. Many of our regular hirers have returned to use the hall, for which we are grateful. We have also been fortunate in securing a grant from South Derbyshire District Council which the Government had made available to the value of £10,000. This will help pay for heating and the general upkeep during the 'lock down' periods.

Due to the Covid restrictions the Committee were unable to hold their usual Annual General Meeting this year, however current members agreed to hold their positions until restrictions are lifted and face to face meetings can once again take place. The Committee would like to wish all Parishioners a MERRY CHRISTMAS and a HAPPY NEW YEAR. We are all hoping that 2021 will bring our community back together, and hopefully our clubs and classes will be able to meet and socialise once again. STAY SAFE



# Medieval Barrow

Ever wondered why we associate "mince meat" with Christmas?

Christmas Pie

The original dish was a large and grand meat pie made of beef, lamb, goose, chicken as well as suet, dried fruit and spices. It was usually oval in shape and easily transformed into a crib with a tiny pastry baby Jesus sculpted and sat on top. It was eaten as a main dish of the Christmas feast until the 17<sup>th</sup> century when England's Puritan-lead Parliament began to curtail Christmas Celebrations.

During medieval times, a wide variety of beverages were also available. One alcoholic beverage though was brewed especially for consumption during Christmas. It was known as "wassail". This word "wassail" or "wes hal" means "be though hale" or "be well". The reply to this was "Be thou hale" or "be well"



Christmas Wassail

Ingredients Juice and zest of 1 lemon 1/3 pint of apple juice 1/6 tsp. Of ground nutmeg <sup>1</sup>/4 tsp of ground ginger <sup>1</sup>/4 tsp of ground cinnamon 28g/ 1oz sugar 500ml/ 1 pint al1 tsp. Honey

1. Simmer the apple juice, lemon juice and zest, spices and sugar in a pan until the sugar has dissolved.

2. Add the ale and honey and then heat through, taking care not to boil wassail.

3. Serve warm with lemon slices floating on top.

Recipe makes 1 ½ pints or 6 small glasses

## COTTAGES IN THE PARISH



Did you know that the Parish Council own 10 cottages at the corner of Brookfield & Twyford Road (opposite The Brookfield Club). There are 8, one bedroom cottages and 2, two bedroom cottages. Each one is very different to the next, all beautiful in their own right. They have been in the Parish Council ownership for many years and are a lovely focal point in the village. The Parish Council rents the cottages out and if you would be interested in being considered to join the waiting list then please contact the Clerk Alison Hicklin on 01332 700142 or email clerk@barrowupontretnparish.co.uk for an application form. There is a basic criteria to be met in order to be considered, firstly you have to be over 18, then your parents or your child has to have been on the electoral role in Barrow upon Trent for 5 years or more. Occasionally we take applications and circumstances into account so if you don't quite qualify its worth asking.



The custom of bringing branches of evergreen fir trees and other examples of nature's greenery such as holly and ivy goes back to times long before Christianity. When the dark nights drew in, there was no electricity to brighten and heat the home nor television to cheer the family. Nature and the gifts it brings were a valuable part of living.

Before the birth of Christ, evergreens were a symbol of everlasting life and a reminder to folks that spring with sunshine and warmth would appear again. They were also believed to protect people from nasty things like ghosts and witches - evil spirits and illness. So for thousands of years the evergreen fir tree has been used to celebrate pagan winter festivals. It is not clear when Fir trees were first used to celebrate Christmas but it is thought to have begun about 1000 years ago in Northern Europe. There are many stories about the joy that these early Christmas trees were associated with but in 1521 such a tree is described as being decorated with "apples and nuts, dates and paper flowers". And candles were placed on the branches to show the twinkling stars awaiting the birth of the Baby Jesus.

The Christmas tree as we know it today is believed to have been brought to Britain by Prince Albert, the husband of Queen Victoria in the 1840s. After this drawing was published in 1848 it became the fashion to have a decorated tree 'like the Royal Family'. (They were, after all the celebrities of the day).

Folks have always used what was available in nature to bring cheer during winter months. It might have been green branches, candles, or a Christmas tree laden with fruit and paper flowers. Or it could be poinsettias and Christmas cacti, as we can today.

Bringing nature back into our village during these difficult times will remind us that spring with sunshine and warmth will soon be with us again.



## NEWS FROM SALE AND DAVYS CE PRIMARY

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

In this porch the window sills are level, not sloped as in some churches. Light from candles placed here was symbolic. As it shone across the churchyard people believed the light would dispel any evil spirits.

# Investment Safety Tips Released After Spike In Derbyshire Fraud Offences

A spike in investment scams over the last year has seen victims in Derbyshire lose more than £6million to faceless fraudsters.

It's a crime that even the most careful investor can fall prey to – whereby someone offers you a fake but often very convincing opportunity to make a profit. Scammers persuade individuals to move money to a fictitious fund on behalf of your business or to pay for a fake investment with the promise of a high return with little to no risk.

Since September 2019, 200 people in Derbyshire fell victim to this scam, and offences have been steadily rising since the COVID-19 pandemic began.

Reports show that young people, aged between 20-29, are now also becoming more vulnerable to fraudsters, who are targeting them through advertisements or posts on social media.

Scammers are leading their victims to professional looking websites, where they're persuaded to invest in the bogus schemes or are led to invest in cryptocurrency scams.

With more and more people looking to invest, we are now launching a campaign to raise awareness of this type of fraud – and how you can best protect yourself.

And to mark the start of International Fraud Week this week, we're releasing a video featuring an actress telling the story of one Derbyshire investor.

It is a true story – one in which the victim was tricked out of more than £210,000.

Derbyshire Constabulary's Cyber Protect Officer, Jodie Nevin, said: "With the coronavirus outbreak causing job losses and having a financial impact on incomes and our economy, more people are online looking for ways to make money.

"Sadly, these factors may leave victims more susceptible to fraudulent investment scams. Though these offences are getting harder to spot, there are some tell-tale signs to help protect your hard-earned money."

In collaboration with Action Fraud, we are also sharing critical tips on how to protect yourself – and your money.

- •Be suspicious. If you are contacted out of the blue about an investment opportunity, this could be via a cold-call, an e-mail or an approach on social media.
- •Don't be rushed into making an investment. No legitimate organisation will pressure you into making a transaction, or committing to something on the spot. Take time to do your research.
- •Seek advice from trusted friends, family members or independent professional advice services before making a significant financial decision. Even genuine investment schemes can be high risk.



- •Use a financial advisor accredited by the Financial Conduct Authority. Paying for professional advice may seem like an unnecessary expense, but it will help prevent you from being scammed.
- •Use the Financial Conduct Authority's register to check if a company is regulated. If you deal with a firm or individual that isn't regulated, you may not be able to get your money back if something goes wrong and its more likely to be a scam.
- •Don't assume it's real. Just because a company has a glossy website and glowing reviews from 'high net worth' investors, does not mean it is genuine. Fraudsters will go to great lengths to convince you they are not a scam.
- •Do NOT provide your identity documents. These fake trading platforms will request proof of your identity. They will tell you this is to comply with antimoney laundering regulations, however the criminals will use your details to sign up for accounts with other services in your name without your permission.
- •Do NOT allow anyone remote access to your computer. You may be asked to download software such as AnyDesk or TeamViewer.
- •Be cautious of bank transfers. There's very little you can do to get your money back if you've made the transfer
- •Remember, if something sounds too good to be true it probably is.
