



WELCOME TO THE JULY EDITION OF THE PARISH NEWS MAGAZINE

BARROW UPON TRENT PARISH COUNCIL - ANNUAL PARISH MEETING 2021

Report of the Chair of the Parish Council

2020 was a very different year for the Parish Council. The Covid-19 pandemic meant that we all had to get used to convening our meetings via Zoom, and these virtual meetings were continued from April 2020 through to our Annual Parish Meeting in June 2021. Not only Councillors, but also members of the public joined us on these meetings.

This is not to say that the work of the Parish Council did not continue apace, ably steered by Alison to whom we owe great thanks for her support, hard work, and constant good humour. The councillors are helped and sustained by Alison in all our work whether parish work, or looking after the parish cottages, and we thank her.

We have a full complement of councillors, having welcomed Claire Cape and Michelle Gardiner since our last Annual Parish Meeting.

Our thanks go to Peter Watson and Daniel Corbin of South Derbyshire District Council who have regularly attended our Parish Council meetings, and to our Safer Neighbourhood Police officers and PCSO who have always made themselves available if we have needed their assistance. Cllr Neil Atkin also attends Council meetings as our County Councillor, and he has supported us or offered advice on many of the issues of the Parish.

We would like to thank all of these people for their continuing support of the Parish Council and the parishioners in both general and specific issues.

The Parish Council has representatives on the Infinity Garden Village steering group and will continue to monitor potential impacts of this development on our parish. We have yet to hear about our application to again change the parish boundary to ensure that the development of the IGV will not impact on our rural parish. An assurance was given in March 2020 that the associated Governance Review could go ahead.

Within the Infinity Garden Village funding has been confirmed for a new secondary school that will be located at the north end of Lowes Lane, in the parish of Barrow upon Trent.

The Council continues its representation on local area committees, representing the views of parishioners and acquainting the village with developments outside of our immediate vicinity. The Parish has representatives on the Gravel Liaison committee with Derbyshire County Council, South Derbyshire District Council, the Environment Agency and Tarmac.

The Parish Council representatives attend meetings with Tarmac and the County Council to monitor work at the nearby quarry and to minimal effects ensure upon the parish. Following the erection of the new bridge over the River Trent, quarrying has now recommenced and the

gravel is processed at the plant on Twyford Road.

The Parish Council continues to support the residents of Arleston and Merrybower in trying to resolve the issues of litter, speeding, anti-social behaviour, fly-tipping etc. in that area of the parish.

Planning issues continue to be considered by the Council on a regular basis.

The Environment Agency announced some years ago that they were about to undertake a further modelling of flooding in the Trent Valley in this area. We have constantly been assured that this work is well underway, but have now been told that this work has been held up with no date for its delivery. We will continue to push for the completion of this work in order that the realignment of the flood areas will alleviate any problems with property insurance costs or valuations experienced in the parish.

Many parishioners have noted the increase in night-time flying from EMA – the Parish Council has been in contact with the various agencies about this.

During 2020 the Parish Council invested in a new website and continues to support the production of the Parish News. The Parish News is now produced quarterly, reflecting the reduction in activities during the pandemic. Everyone is welcome to make use of these media, and if there are any suggestions for change, we would welcome feedback. These are the main vehicles for information from the Council to parishioners

The cottages continue to provide attractive and comfortable accommodation for parishioners. The cottages are fully occupied, and the Council maintains a list of eligible parishioners who wish to be considered as future tenants. Over the last few months checks have been made on the cottage electrical supplies and upgrade work completed as required.

The Susie Dixon Park provides excellent sporting facilities for the village, and continues to provide excellent pitches and grass areas for football and other sports and exercise. The Forest School area continues to provide an area for learning for the school.

The Council continues to maintain the cemetery as an attractive and peaceful area of the village. Our thanks go to Kevin, our Parish Lengthsman for his continued work around the village, keeping the cemetery, roadways and parish areas clean and tidy.

The Greenacres area is developing and maturing, and the Parish Council continues to undertake maintenance of the trees and bushes in the area. Elephant Holdings who are developing the industrial site on Sinfin Lane have signed an agreement to provide grass management for the Greenacres area for the forthcoming 15 years. We have also enlisted the help of Ben Capes who has volunteered to help with the maintenance of the flora and fauna in the area. The popularity of this area, both for people from the parish and others from further away, is testament to the success of the project that was begun several years ago.

The Parish Precept was raised by a minimal amount in 2020. We continue to undertake extensive work around the parish and following the major investments of recent years, we are now able to gradually build a reserve fund for unexpected expenditure. We expect that forthcoming changes in Government legislation will continue to require us to make upgrades on the parish properties.

The Council is continually grateful for the interest of parishioners in Parish Council matters, and welcomes any questions or comments, especially during the public sessions within each Parish Council meeting. All Councillors are very happy to receive questions or comments at any time, and we shall continue to do the best we can for the parish and the people who live here.

CLERKS REPORT

The last year has been a different one to say the least. When I took this job on a number of years ago, I said I wanted to keep my brain active well that has certainly happened in the last 12 months. Covid 19 has thrown a great many challenges at everyone over the last year. Holding virtual meetings on something called zoom, was one of them. It was a total novelty for me and I had to pick it up q uickly. With the challenge accepted, it very soon became clear that not many others had ever used zoom before either! But we got there and despite poor connections, freezing screens, and the "your muted" all being a regular part of the meetings I think we all managed very well.

So what have we been up to? The cottages and their tenants have become part of my life. Not a week goes by without me speaking to one or more of the tenants either to report that they have a problem or just to say hello. No's 12 and 8 have new tenants No 16a become empty towards the end of last year, but as I write today, they are all now full. Various maintenance works have been carried out with boilers being repaired and replaced where necessary, the Lights to the rear of the cottages has all been updated with LED'S, the programme of bathroom refurbishments continues with just a couple left to do. We know that soon the windows and doors on the front of the cottages will need replacing and this will be a very costly job as they will have to be hand made as no two are the same. We are also keeping a close eye on all the new legal requirements that keep being brought in the latest one being Electrical safety certificates for rental properties that need doing every 5 years. These, along with the yearly gas safety inspections have all been carried out.

The new Planters we ordered at the front of the cottages were very disappointing, but I am assured the summer ones will be fabulous.

In November I set about a new web site for the Parish Council with the help of 2commune. this again brought me new challenges which I really enjoyed. I am still having to resort to the instructions occasionally on how to upload things but I'm getting there!

The Cemetery continues to be a credit to everyone who helps maintain it, we have had a couple of

burials over the last year and some plots purchased for the future.

The Community Park, Small Playing Field and Greenacres have been extremely well used during lockdown, sadly this increased the amount of litter we had left in the Parish but Kevin our Parish Lengthsman rose to the challenge and has done a wonderful job of keeping the Parish neat and tidy.

I was thrilled when nearly the whole village embraced the Winter Windowland idea and the Parish Looked beautiful with all the various displays I'm sure during what has been a very different year this really did make people smile. I am very much hoping this will carry on for years to come and light up the village every Christmas.

Financially the Parish continues to benefit from the cottages with us being able to keep the precept relatively unchanged year to year, and the bank account remains in a strong position going forward.

I feel extremely fortunate to have such a lovely group of Parish Councillors to work with, it makes my job very pleasurable. The Chairman Anne Heathcote is a constant support and source of knowledge and I really would be lost without her. I would like to thank all of the Councillors for the time they give to the Parish and its lovely that we have our full compliment of 6 councillors with Claire Cape & Michelle Gardiner filling the most recent vacancies. We are also greatly supported by District Councillors Dan Corbin, Peter Watson and County Councillor Neil Atkin who work hard on our behalf and I would like to thank them for that. I look forward to working with and for you all in the coming year.

ST WILFRID'S CHURCH REPORT Tuesday 1st June 2021

Since the last Annual Parish Meeting, much has happened with our parish church. Having achieved the funding needed to undertake the Transformation Project, thanks to the hard work of the Friends Committee and many people in the parish, the work on the internal transformation commenced in May 2020, delayed slightly by the advent of the Covid -19 pandemic. By the beginning of December 2020, the building work was complete – it was accomplished to

a very high standard by Briddons, and is much admired by everyone who visits.

The Covid-19 pandemic had an enormous effect upon the church, both just prior to and after the building work. As a result of the three lockdowns, and the Government advice about congregations in church, we had our last full service on March 15th, and services did not recommence during 2020.

From Easter 2021 we have been able to begin services twice each month on a very limited basis with a small congregation and no singing. We also hope that the school will be able to recommence school service in the church this summer.

Other activities in church were also curtailed; youth group and "tea and chat". Although "tea and chat" has begun again recently, the youth group, we hope, will recommence in September. This is alongside many other activities that we hope will start in the church in the near future.

We are grateful to all who contribute in any way to the work on, and maintenance of, this beautiful building and its churchyard, and to the people who have continued to support the Friends of St Wilfrid's.

We now have a church building available for anyone who wants to use it for many different activities. Please feel free to have a look around, use it and enjoy!

VILLAGE HALL COMMITTEE REPORT

The past year has been a difficult time for everyone. We have been fortunate in relation to our Village Hall – as our local preschool (who attend the hall daily) have remained open throughout the Covid pandemic. This has helped retain some form of normality for our local pre school children. We have also been receiving ongoing payments for the hire of the hall from preschool, which we are grateful for. Many halls throughout Derbyshire have remained closed throughout the pandemic.

We were unable to hold our Annual General Meeting in the usual format during May of last year, however current members of the committee had agreed to retain their roles for 2020/21.

We are hoping to hold our next **Annual General Meeting** during late June/ early July 2021, posters will be placed around the various village notice boards to include the time, date and venue once the **AGM** meeting has been confirmed. Please do support our local Village Hall by attending our meetings and getting involved. Once again, when confirmed dates for our regular meetings (held every 4 months) 2021/22 are known they will be displayed within the Village Hall/ Parish Councils notice boards, and Parish webpages.

We would like to thank Mr. David Stone who has been kind enough to audit our books this year, David provides this as a voluntarily service, and we are very grateful to him.

We have been lucky enough to secure several grants during the pandemic period from South Derbyshire District Council, this has helped our financial situation, and enabled us to undertake various aspects of work required to upgrade the hall.

The parquet floor has been sanded down and re sealed, specialist cleaning products are now used to protect the floor for future years. New carpet tiles have been laid in the entrance area, along each walkway area within the hall, and throughout the disabled toilet area. Old photographs of Barrow village/ Swarkestone bridge etc. have been placed onto canvas prints, and have been mounted along the back wall of the hall – hopefully adding a little more character to the building. Work has also taken place to upgrade the electrical system.

We have ongoing projects which we hope will take place during the summer holiday break period, these include replacement radiators throughout the building, and new wooden fencing which will be installed at the back of the building. Access around the back of the hall has been impossible, therefore a large clearance operation has taken place around the sides/ back of the village hall clearing away very overgrow ivy/ bushes/ overgrowth etc.

As at the time of writing this update, we are beginning to see a few of our smaller hiring groups asking to return which is excellent news. The

committee work hard on behalf of the Parish to help keep the hall in good order, and rates for hire remain very competitive.

SOUTH DERBYSHIRE DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT BY DAN CORBIN, NEIL ATKIN & PETER WATSON

Good Evening Chairman, Councillors, Ladies and Gentlemen,

It has been a pleasure to attend your remote meetings during this most unusual year and we have pleasure in presenting this Annual report to Barrow upon Trent Parish Council together with the District Council Tax Budget for 2021 – 2022. It was with regret that a report was not presented last year because of the severe restrictions at the time caused by the Covi-19 Pandemic and remote meetings were not allowed or organised at the scheduled date for the 2020 meeting so it was cancelled.

Council Tax

South Derbyshire District Council will be increasing their tax this year by 1.50%, which is lower than the maximum allowed. Other major preceptors have chosen to increase their precept by varying amounts namely Derbyshire County Council 1.5%, DCC Adult Social Care 1.0%, Police 6.6% and the Fire Service 2.0%. The combined effect is that there will be increase of 2.9% in the Annual Council Tax, excluding local Parish precepts, which is collected on behalf of all the preceptors by the District Council.

Infinity Garden Village

The Infinity Garden Village Liaison has continued with meetings being held remotely.

A new junction J3A will be constructed on the A50 where it there is a bridge over Deepdale Lane. Following opening of the new junction it is intended that Deepdale Lane will be reclassified to a lower grade with even more restricted use than at present as far as the Barrow Bridge over the Trent & Mersey Canal.

A new Academy for children over 11 will be built near to the western end of The Infinity Parkway.

The Liaison Group is most concerned with the apparent lack of interest in the scheme from the Medical Authorities and will continue to pursue for the provision of suitable facilities for the envisaged large increase in population.

Arleston Lane

The problems reported at earlier Annual Meetings still continue with varying levels of inconvenience and disturbance to residents of the Lane.

Donington Park Race Track

The track is now under new ownership, Motor Sport Vision (MSV), and their liaison to date has been positive and responsive. Cllr Peter Watson will attend Donington Race Track meetings when the circuit is back in full use following suspension of activities in 2020.

East Midlands Airport

Passenger traffic has been virtually nil for 2020 but freight has continued without disruption. Night time noise has unfortunately caused disturbance particularly in Weston & Barrow due to some most unusual meteorological conditions Colleen Hampson of EMA responded to the reasons for the noise most promptly.

Swarkestone Gravel

The operations on the site have been restricted because e of lack of demand brought about by the pandemic. Restoration is not complete on the worked-out areas and this will be a major item to be discussed at the first Liaison Meeting following resumption of normal working in June this year.

A new, temporary, bridge together with access embankments has been constructed over the River Trent near to Anchor Church to facilitate gravel extraction south of the river.

Thanks to the community

This last year 2020/21 has been very challenging for all, so we look forward optimistically to next year and wish to thank you for your support and we confirm that the three of us work as a team so you can contact any of us to help.

SALE & DAVYS REPORT TO THE PARISH COUNCIL MAY 2021

On March 20th 2020 all schools were closed due to Covid 19. Sale and Davys Cof E remained open for vulnerable pupils and pupils of key workers during this time. On June 1st schools reopened to reception, year 1 and year 6 pupils, providing that 2 metre social distancing was in place. Sale and Davys was able to welcome back 30 children in total. Due to 2 metre social distancing the school was not able to welcome back any other year group other than reception.

Remote learning programmes were put into place for the majority of children who were working from home. Class teachers planned maths, English and topic lessons which were accessed on a secure learning platform. Teachers and pupils communicated via email and blogs and children were able to upload their work so that it could be marked. Resources to help teach maths remotely were purchased. These included video links and powerpoints. Parents were kept up to date through weekly letters which signposted new online learning developments and useful links. Many parents and pupils struggled during the first lockdown. Parents were trying to juggle work, home learning with more than one child and looking after the family. Pupils often became frustrated if they had little support and some lacked motivation. Parents were able to email or phone the headteacher if they needed help or advice with home learning but it soon became apparent that pupils desperately needed face to face learning.

In the latter part of the Summer Term zoom quizzes were

introduced to the children. These were well attended and pupils looked forward to seeing their teacher and friends. We were all extremely disappointed when the usual Summer Term activities were not able to take place. There was no Sports Day, Swimming Gala or Leavers' Service. However we did manage to have an 'Outdoor Leavers' Celebration for the year 6 children who were invited back into school for the last 3 days of term.

In September 2020 the staff were delighted to welcome back all children. This was due to replacing social distancing in schools with 'Class Bubbles'. During the Autumn Term Sale and Davys felt almost normal. The school was full of the buzz of learning and children's laughter. However, due to class bubbles children only ever saw children from their own class. Playtimes were in zoned areas, children ate their packed lunch in their classroom and drop off and pick up times were staggered to limit numbers.

Everyone at Sale and Davys was determined to make the Autumn Term as close to normal as possible. The Autumn Term is probably the most exciting term for children, especially with the lead up to Christmas. The Harvest Festival was our first celebration. Children brought in their harvest gifts and these were displayed near the main entrance. An outdoor Service took place which was led by the pupils and this was recorded and shared with parents and grandparents. Christmas was a key focus for everyone. Every child took part in at least one performance and all activities were recorded and shared on our website so that parents, grandparents and members of our local community could celebrate Christmas with us. Carol singing, Christmas craft day, The Festive Afternoon, The Santa Mile, Christmas parties, a virtual visit from Santa, decorating Christmas trees and Christmas jumper day were just some of the events recorded. During this time, when Covid cases were rising all around us and local schools were closing bubbles and whole sites, Sale and Davys managed to stay open. All of our class bubbles remained open and none of our children tested positive for Covid 19.

On January 4th 2021 all schools were closed once again due to the pandemic. The school once again remained open for vulnerable pupils and pupils of key workers and there were 37 (33%) pupils attending each week.

During this second lockdown remote learning was put back into place for all pupils working from home. This time we introduced live lessons which took place each day. Children logged onto zoom in the morning and were able to see their teacher and friends. Class teachers taught maths and English and then explained the tasks for the day. A zoom 'catch up' session was timetabled for the afternoon so that children could share their work or discuss any problems they had.100% of our children accessed the live lessons and parents and pupils were

much more engaged with learning during this second lockdown.

On March 8th 2021 banners and balloons were put up outside the school gates to welcome all the children back. Class bubbles were put back into operation and once again children did not mix with other classes. Covid cases slowly began to drop and as the weather became warmer we decided to try a whole school, socially distanced, outdoor worship. This was the first time the school had been together for over a year. Reception children excitedly waved to the older children and older children were desperate to know the younger children's names. Being a church school, worship is extremely important for us. This is the time we are all together as a school family. We now try to hold one outdoor worship a week, weather permitting.

It is now over a year since the pandemic started and we are gradually seeing a return to normal school life. Over the last few months and weeks we have taken very small steps forward, always ensuring that children and staff are safe. To date, we are still very pleased to report that the school has remained open throughout the pandemic. No class bubbles have had to close and no children or teachers have tested positive for Covid 19. This term we have lots of things to look forward to. Year 5 and year 6 have a residential trip at Kingswood where they will be taking part in lots of adventurous outdoor activities. Trent Class are visiting West Park Leisure Centre to try out the new high rope adventure course and all the younger children are going to Conkers to explore the wildlife.

We are all now looking forward to the new academic year when restrictions will hopefully be fully lifted. This will enable all our children to access a rich and exciting curriculum which develops resilience and a love of learning.

Our treasurer suggested we could afford to reduce our own share of the subs this year by £10 per member so this is what we have done. Hopefully the bank balance will recover in the future.

ANNUAL REPORT Sale & Davys Playgroup June 2021

The last year has certainly tested us all in very, and many, different ways. The Trustees at Sale & Davys Playgroup are extremely happy to report that we are 'still standing'. Just prior to March 2020 a new Manager had been recruited, and an existing staff member promoted to Deputy Manager. Although playgroup closed, the staff worked relentlessly to ensure they were all fully conversant with COVID rules and regulations for re-opening. At the same time the Manager and Deputy Manager took up the reigns in their new roles (from home) to ensure that playgroup would maintain consistency. We re-opened on June 16th 2020.

We have been extremely lucky having the support of the Village Hall Committee so that playgroup could have exclusive use of the hall during these times. The children, as always, took it all in their stride. All in their own little bubble, and having great fun. 17 children left to start school in the July. Playgroup resumed in September 2020 with 17 children on role, 8 new starters too. A fantastic result for our little setting. July 2021 sees a cohort of 12 children, however, September 2021 starts with 18 on role and some new starters in the upcoming weeks thereafter.

As regulations change daily, the staff have been kept on their toes and they have all done such an amazing job. It has certainly helped with having exclusive use of the hall, the wonderful surroundings that the setting has sitting right on its doorstep and our great use of the vegetable patch. The children thrive on trotting around the village come rain or shine. A further staff member, to ensure correct child/staff ratios, was recruited in April 2021. We now have 5 (Level 3) staff members.

A new Trustee was appointed in September 2020 due to the resignation of an existing Trustee. There are currently 3 Trustees.

Our current financial position is stable but pre-school settings will always have to fight for their position in the education system. The peaks and troughs of child numbers, and the lack of increase in government funding, that never matches their expectations of minimum wage and WPP, is extremely testing.

There are lots of organisations, parents, previous staff members, volunteers and committee members that have all contributed (in one way or another) to us being able to maintain playgroup so far. Thank you to all of you.

Although this has been challenging times, the staff have been very positive and the children have responded. They are an extremely happy bunch of children who are learning through their play and that is all we could hope for.

We wish our July 2021 leavers all the success as they continue their journey on to school.

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
